Family urges others to join fundraiser

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ONE of the greatest joys of being new parents is bringing your little ones home from the hospital.

But Felbridge mum and dad Emma and Andrew Maxwell were forced to leave their little boy Henry in hospital when they took his twin sister Sophie home.

Shortly after his birth Henry suffered "complications". He was placed into intensive care at just

nine days old, given medicine to help his pancreas function properly. He was subsequently diagnosed with quadriplegic cerebral palsy.

This was to prove to be the start of a long journey for the family, who are being supported with a Spring Ball in March when The Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity, which supports babies and children under five who have Cerebral Palsy, is throwing a bash at the Felbridge Hotel.

Mrs Maxwell explained: "In December 2011 my husband and I found out that we were having twins,

at the time we thought that this would be the biggest challenge we would face – having two babies to look after at the same time. How wrong we were.

"Sophie came home from hospital at two days old but it would be another six long weeks and a few emergency ambulance journeys later before Henry was well enough and strong enough to make our family complete.

"After a few months Sophie could hold her cup but Henry just didn't seem interested in even trying. In the early days we thought he was being lazy but as he grew older we realised that there was something wrong."

Cerebral palsy is a group of movement disorders and may include problems with sensation, vision, hearing, swallowing and speaking.

Quadriplegia means that it affects all four limbs. But three years on, the family have made huge strides towards health and happiness with the help of The Dame Vera Lynn Children's Charity.

Mr and Mrs Maxwell are asking people to buy tickets to the ball for a loved one this Christmas in order to support the charity and its life-changing work.

Bewildered

And despite feeling "bewildered, scared and unsure" about her family's future, Mrs Maxwell is now confident.

She added: "When Henry first joined the service, he couldn't sit independently, let alone play with toys by himself. Now, he will sit and wheel his toy cars backwards and forwards, he loves playing with bubbles and doing painting and colouring.

"He is learning to crawl and to kneel supporting himself with his arms and to push himself off the sofa independently. All things that we would not have thought were possible without the charity's support.

"The charity receives no statutory funding and has to raise £480,000 each year to survive. Andrew and I truly hope our story may inspire you to donate to such a fantastic and local cause and help Henry to reach his full potential."

The Spring Ball will take place on March 19, and the night will start off with a drinks reception followed by a three-course meal.
